Growing churches have a Biblical sermon at the centre of the worship service. Have you ever asked why? Have you ever questioned if we should drop the sermon? What would happen? Or, why is the sermon so important that growing churches build their public worship service around the sermon?

A Clear definition of Biblical Preaching

To understand why the sermon is so important for growth, a clear definition of what Biblical preaching is goes a long way to finding an answer. John Stott believes that Biblical preaching *"is to open up the inspired text with such faithfulness and sensitivity that God's voice is heard and his people obey him."* [1]

Everyone who is seeking meaning or understanding wants to hear God's voice. John Stott says that is what should happen when true Biblical preaching takes place in church. Not only do we hear God but are encouraged to obey Him.


How it all started

Many trace the origin of Biblical preaching to the time of Nehemiah and Ezra after the return of Israel from captivity. These godly leaders wanted to put an end to the continual cycle of Israel's neglect and apostasy from the one true God. Their solution was not just preaching, but Biblical preaching! Notice what the record say says took place:

"All the people gathered as one man at the square which was in front of the Water Gate, and they asked Ezra the scribe to bring the book of the law of Moses which the Lord had given to Israel." Nehemiah 8:1 NASB

Note that the people did not gather to hear Ezra; they came to hear from the book he brought with him, the book of the law.

"He read from it before the square which was in front of the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of men and women, those who could understand; and all the people were attentive to the book of the law." Nehemiah 8:3





Note that we still finish church at midday.

"Ezra stood on a wooden podium which they had made for the purpose..." Nehemiah 8:4

"Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up." Nehemiah 8:5

"They read from the book, from the law of God, translating (explaining) to give the sense so that they understood the reading." Nehemiah 8:8

"...For all the people were weeping when they heard the words of the law." Nehemiah 8:9

Note the Key ingredients of Nehemiah's account:

- The people were gathered
- The book was read
- Speaker stood above the crowd
- The people reverence the Law
- The Speaker gave it meaning so the people understood
- The people responded with broken hearts

May the churches of the SNSW Conference always value the power of the spoken word, and may we continue to open the Bible and give it meaning. In doing this we will not only continue to grow and introduce new people to Christ but continue a practice that dates back over 2500 years.

Eugowra 120 Year Anniversary

Sabbath June 1 saw over a 100 people join together to celebrate the 120 year anniversary of the dedication for the first Seventh-day Adventist Church west of the Blue Mountains in Eugowra.

Family representatives of the original founding members including Kent's, Gersbach's and Chatman's shared stories of how God has led since 1904 when the church opened, and praised Him for the impact the little Church has had across Australia and beyond. Pr Anthony Kent, current Associate Ministerial Secretary for the General Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, led out in a sharing time for Sabbath School and then Pr Gary Kent, speaker for The Incredible Journey media ministry took the sermon on Bible Truths and the foundation of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Following lunch, the group headed out to the location of the church, where the current property owner had opened up the gate granting access to the site allowing an up close look at the church building.

Prior to the weekend, a group of cyclists set out from Brisbane to ride to Eugowra, completing just over 1,000kms arriving in Eugowra on the Friday afternoon of the celebratory weekend. This ride was in recognition of the literature evangelist Philip Reekie who rode his bike through New South Wales and shared the book The Great Controversy with Tom Kent. From that book and the church in Eugowra, an estimated 20,000 lives have been transformed. A prayer of thanksgiving was offered and we look forward to Jesus' soon return.



Go Big or Go Home

Many no doubt are familiar with the expression 'Go Big or Go Home.' It evokes an all or nothing approach to whatever we do. As we've been discovering, that isn't the best mantra to adopt when it comes to making desirable behaviours stick. Or is it?

While the Go Big or Go Home mindset can lead to selfsabotaging our best efforts in changing for the better, there are some elements that we can apply to good effect, the first of these is commitment or resolution. A resolution brings with it a firmness of intent and a higher degree of self-discipline. These are necessary elements in the change process, without them, we can all too easy be all too easy on ourselves. We know when this is happening as we have a self-justifying conversation in our head, eg., "well you know you've had a big day", and "besides you deserve to take some time to yourself." Both mental conversations could be true, but self-discipline and firm commitment reframes our desired behaviour into the taking time for your self experience. This reframing, then makes the intended behaviour a reward rather than a chore.

The next positive of Go Big or Go Home is that it calls us to make our intention BIG within our environment. That

is, we want to make our desired behaviour as obvious as possible within the flow of our daily lives.

Consider this example, suppose you have a goal of writing your memoirs or family tree and you intend to write 500 words at 9pm every Monday and Wednesday after the dinner dishes are cleared away. However, you frequently catch yourself looking at Facebook on your phone while watching the latest reality TV show, because you've had a big day and need some you time. To effect the desired change, we could put a post-it note on the TV remote reminding ourselves that at 9pm we are writing 500 words of our memoirs. As we commence writing, we discover the joy and are better able to see this self-disciplined action as an investment not only in our goals, but in our future selves.

Action steps: Reflect on your attitude to your desired/ intended behaviour. Do you see it as an investment or a chore? Ask - How can you make your intended behaviour BIG in your daily environment? 2 Tim. 1:7 ESV "for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and selfcontrol."





Tumut Youth Rally

On Saturday 15th June, Youth from all around SNSW gathered in Tumut to hear Pr. Abel Afele share about 'Kingdom Mindset'. The powerhouse Afele brothers (Pr. Roger and Pr. Abel Afele) led a workshop and church service focusing on Colossians 3 and how we can live a practical life with a 'Kingdom Mindset'.

In order to live a 'Kingdom Mindset' we were encouraged to 'Love God First' then 'Love our Neighbour' - how can we love our neighbours if we don't love God first? We were challenged to 'set our mind on things above, not on things on the earth' (Colossians 3:2) in order to seek the Kingdom of God. When we seek the kingdom of God, we start to see God's love and everything else aligns.

Pr. Abel used the analogy of an umbrella - An umbrella protects you in the rain but it doesn't stop the rain from happening. God's love for us is the same. His love doesn't stop the rain (or the challenges in our life) but it allows us to stand firm and strong.
